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PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

The University of the West Indies, St. Augustine through its involvement in the EU LAC Focus Project proposed CATALYST: Harmonising Actions in the Caribbean Creative Ecology - A Creative Ideas Lab, to enhance current approaches to develop the region's creative sector. CATALYST is a joint effort between The UWI, The British Council and The EU LAC. The EU LAC FOCUS is a collaborative project funded by the European Commission under Grant Agreement No 693781. This forum seeks to harmonise the activities of the actors, agencies and stakeholders in the Caribbean creative ecology including international funders, regional agencies, national governments, cultural workers and creative enterprises.

The UWI is invested in CATALYST for many reasons. Firstly, The UWI's Triple A Strategy 2017-2022: Revitalising Caribbean Development challenges the university to provide strategies to develop the natural resources of the region. In keeping with this mandate, the creative industries sector has been identified as one of the platforms for spearheading efforts to diversify Caribbean economies and improve social cohesion. Therefore, The UWI is tasked with developing a research cluster in this area to guide and inform decision-making in the region.

It is envisaged that CATALYST will provide an opportunity to get high-level decision-makers, funders and creativities in the same space to discuss how funding and technical assistance actually affect their work in the creative ecology. This information will then be used to hone a more coordinated, inclusive and evidence based approach to the sector's development. The UWI looks forward to collaborating with international agencies such as the British Council, regional actors and cultural practitioners in the service of converting this most important of regional assets into real developmental energy.

BACKGROUND AND RATIONALE

The proposal to host this workshop was based in part on the goals of the EU-LAC Focus Project, which seeks to 'give focus' to the cultural, scientific and social dimensions of co-operation between the European Union and the Caribbean. More specifically, the project is responding to the stated need to enhance the 'common vision' between the two regions through the sharing of research and activities in the cultural sector.

> The workshop serves as a platform to begin much needed discussions on harmonizing activities in the regional cultural sector. In this regard, the initiatives by the key players in the sector such as CARICOM, the Caribbean Development Bank, the British Council, the European Union and national governments will be mapped and examined with the view to identifying overlaps and gaps in their activities. All of these organisations have identified the development of the cultural and creative industries as part their individual mandates but have developed different, oppositional or overlying modalities to realize this goal.

> > Therefore, the main objective of CATALYST is to record the views of cultural practitioners who are on the receiving end of these efforts. Their experiences will be matched against the aims of funding programmes, national cultural policies and the research of the academic community to assess the overall efficacy of actions in the Caribbean cultural ecology.

> > > Together, this group of practitioners, funders, technocrats, researchers and activists will begin to map ways to create better institutional linkages, streamline policies and investment to foster a healthier cultural ecology in the region.


